Per your request, the following represents actions taken in regard to establishing fees for the City's curbside yard waste collection service:

-Ordinance #3671, Passed 4-6-2010, established fee at \$4.50 per month on a twice per month pick up basis for an 8 month billing season. Anticipated participation rate of 3,000 dwellings. Actual customers: 1,534.

-Ordinance #3716, Passed 3-21-2011, adjusted fee to \$9.00 per month on a weekly pick up basis for an 8 month billing season. Anticipated participation rate adjusted to 2,000 dwellings. Cost of service included purchase of new truck with "grabber" attachment.

-Ordinance #3788, Passed 4-1-2013, adjusted fee to \$9.60 per month effective May, 1, 2013, on a weekly pick up basis for an 8 month billing season. Current customer count approx. 2,100.

In addition, by closing during these low volume months, it will prevent having to pull operators from their projects to cover the Yard Waste facility.

Storm Event Overview:

The night shift was in, preparing for the impending snowstorm at 9:00 p.m. on 11/28/16 when they were advised by P.D. that snow was beginning to stick on the roadways around town. The night shift began plowing and applying material to priority 1's, 2's and trouble areas. The plow teams contended with snowfall and strong winds causing open areas to ice up and drift with snow. Medians on Hwy. 59 and Enzi were enhancing snowdrift formation making it difficult to keep those areas clear. Snowfall dwindled at around 2:00 a.m. allowing the night shift to make better progress in priority areas. Day shift took over at 7:00 a.m. and was able to clear the remaining drifts from priority areas and trouble spots by 9:00 a.m. The snow event was then ended and day shift continued cleaning up drifted spots in various subdivisions and trouble areas.

Firefighter Shafer





The Heart Attack Kid... Your Final Knockout!

We've all known that heart attacks have been a leading factor in the death of firefighters, but the question is, have you done anything about it for yourself? We hear every month during the Business Meeting of the loss and the cause of fallen firefighters throughout the United States, but we never look at that as being something that can hit right here at home. It can happen today, at any time, to any member of this department. The focus should come right back to YOU and how YOU are taking care of YOURSELF to prevent such tragedies from occurring.

Do you understand the difference between a heart attack and cardiac arrest? They are not the same thing. A **heart attack** is damage to an area of heart muscle that has been deprived of oxygen, usually due to a blockage. This is typically accompanied by chest pain radiating down one or both arms. Also understand that females respond to a heart attack different than males. Signs in women suffering from a heart attack include uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of the chest, shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort, pain in the back, neck, jaw, or stomach, and cold sweats with nausea and lightheadedness. **Cardiac arrest** is when the heart malfunctions and stops beating unexpectedly. This is triggered by an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat. The pumping action of the heart has been disrupted to the point of where blood to the brain, lungs and other organs is not possible. Seconds later, a person becomes unresponsive and the heart stops beating.



So the question that should be running through your mind is how can I prevent this from happening? Realistically, we all know what we can do to prevent it; it's the fact that we just don't do it. WHY???. Why are you not maintaining a healthy life style to prevent tragedy from occurring down the road in life? The top three tips for preventing heart disease is exercising daily, eating healthy, and avoiding tobacco products and alcohol. Well that all sounds really easy right? WRONG! It is a change of lifestyle, if you aren't doing it already, to become more active and to put down the Big Mac and have grilled chicken instead. It's putting down the T.V. remote and either working out or simply going on a walk. Nobody said that you have to work out to the point where you are puking, but simply getting out and being active. Yes, I push myself knowing that I can go a little further today than what I did yesterday. It's not allowing myself to become comfortable, because once I do I become complacent.

I not only push myself but others around me so they can find their inner strength inside that shows just how far you can go. I want to live a long, happy and healthy life and to pass away in my sleep but that comes with work. We aren't only healthy to benefit ourselves but to benefit everyone around us. Your family depends on you to take care of yourself so you can walk your daughter down the aisle, so you can celebrate retirement with your husband, so you can cherish moments with your grandchildren and great grandchildren. The list goes on and on but ultimately it comes right back to YOU. Look past our families and how about the community we live in that you swore to serve in their times of need. The homeowner doesn't want to see an out of shape firefighter stepping off the truck, struggling to get their pack on. They don't want to hear why you were unable to move at the pace necessary to do your job. They want results and they want them NOW! By not being healthy not only risks you, but your crew and the department as a whole. When you step foot onto the rig and take that seat, you are either increasing or decreasing your crew's chances of going home. You're either an asset or you're a liability. There's also that question that has been out there that many of us have heard. Would YOU want YOU rescuing YOU???

Do you need motivation to get fit? How about avoiding death? Avoiding death is a good one!

Bring the Heart Attack Kid to a halt and give him a knockout of his own. It's time to take care of you. Nobody else is going to do it but you. People's lives depend on it, including your own!!! Don't wait another day, ACT NOW!!!!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

Need ideas for all that left over Turkey. Well here is a couple from Lori Jones

Enchiladas

- 1 Medium onion, diced
- 1 Can green chiles, chopped
- 1 Tbsp Oil
- 1 Can green enchilada sauce (15 oz. or larger depending on your taste)
- 8-12 Medium tortillas
- 2 Cups shredded cheese (Fiesta or Mexican pre-shredded work great)
- 1-2 pounds chicken or turkey
- 1 cake pan or dish of same size.

Cook and shred chicken or turkey. Sauté onion and green chiles in large pan. Add shredded meat and half of the enchilada sauce. Spray baking dish. Add some enchilada sauce to pan (to prevent enchiladas from sticking). Fill each tortilla with meat mixture and shredded cheese. Place “seam” side down in pan. When pan is filled, pour remaining enchilada sauce over rolled tortillas. Add cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Garnish with picante and sour cream if desired.

Alternate-casserole style

Cook and shred chicken or turkey. Sauté onion and green chiles in large pan. Add shredded meat and enchilada sauce. Spray baking dish. Add a little enchilada sauce to pan to help prevent casserole from sticking. Tear 6 tortillas into pieces—approximately 1 inch. (If children want to help they can be the “tortilla tearer”. Put pieces evenly in dish. Put half of meat mixture over tortillas. Sprinkle half of cheese over meat mixture. Tear and put remaining tortillas on top, remaining meat mixture, remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Alternate “I have adults and kids” style

In dish roll half of the enchiladas and prepare the other half casserole style. This is a great compromise for families. Children have an easier time eating this casserole style.





Green Turkey Chile

- 1 Medium Onion diced
- 1 Can chopped green chiles
- 1-2 pounds cooked and shredded turkey
- 3 Can great northern beans
- Chile seasoning

In large pan or skillet sauté onion and green chile. Add shredded turkey, and the great northern beans. Season to taste. Bring to a boil and then simmer about 20 minutes. This is awesome. 

