RE: Winland Industrial Park – Follow-up to previous Wyoming Business Council Funding in the Southern Industrial Park

Please find the breakdown of the recent funding contributions for the Southern Industrial Park area as provided by the Wyoming Business Council staff in the summary below. I have parenthetically added the entity that each project was associated with.

"In response to our conversation, listed below are the awards made in the Southern Industrial Park of Gillette. These projects were granted to either the city of Gillette or Campbell County.

- 1. Liebherr Water Project - \$911,950 (City)*
- 2. Robertson Water, Sewer and Street Project - \$2,615,000 (County)*
- 3. Southern Industrial Roads Project - \$1,864,571 (County)*
- 4. Southern Industrial Addition Project - \$1,645,046 grant, \$2,645,046 loan (City)*

Projects total - \$9,681,613 in grants and loans from the WBC to the city of Gillette or Campbell County. The city of Gillette and Campbell County did match those funds with \$2,754,306 or 28% of total project costs."

As discussed in the Work Session on August 29th, it is correct that nearly \$10 million in grants and loans have been awarded to this area of Gillette. Approximately \$2.6 million in grants and \$2.6 million in loans have been awarded in behalf of the City, the remaining \$4.5 million having been awarded in behalf of the County.

RE: Dalbey Park to Energy Capital Sports Complex Pathway Project

Background:

We would like to provide an update regarding the funding and upcoming bid award for the new pathway project to connect Dalbey Park with the Energy Capital Sports Complex. The project provides a new 8' wide concrete pathway from Butler Spaeth Road to Garner Lake Road and into the Sports Complex, including a new pedestrian bridge across Donkey Creek and on-street bike lane striping on Sinclair Street where existing sidewalks are less than 8' wide. This is the first of multiple pathway projects that will eventually connect the college area to the regional park facility. The project was designed in-house by City Engineering staff and was recently bid on August 8th where four bids were received.

Project Funding Summary:

The WYDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) has awarded a grant in the amount of \$244,517 for this project. This award amount is based on an 80/20 cost share with the City. The City will be paying for their match using 1% Sales Tax Funds (via the 1% Bike and Walking Pathways fund).

The City budgeted \$329,517.00 for this project, which includes the TAP grant funds. The current remaining balance for this project is \$321,618.24. Attached is a copy of the recent bid results. The apparent low bidder is S&S Builders with a bid of \$371,631.50. There is also an additionally estimated \$6,000 for testing and \$4,000 for construction contingencies. This leaves the current project funding approximately \$60,000 short.

In order to move the project forward to bid award, and to take full advantage of the grant funding, Staff would like to recommend that the City budget an additional \$60,000 from the 1% budget to cover the current funding shortfall for this project. These funds could be allocated from the currently estimated unassigned cash on-hand from last fiscal year, which includes previous year project savings and additional tax revenues that came in through the end of the fiscal year.

This project is on the September 5th Council Agenda for consideration for award. We would be glad to answer any questions at the August 29th Work Session. Thank you.

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
Future Dalbey/ECSC Connecting Path



MEMORANDUM TO COUNCIL

The Wyoming Supreme Court recently issued a decision which affects all municipal courts in the State. Traditionally in Wyoming, municipal judges have placed individuals on probation along with a suspended fine for many youth type offenses - particularly those dealing with alcohol and marijuana. Jail time was not imposed as part of the process. The City of Gillette did not impose jail time as part of the sentence. First, our City Code currently does not impose a jail sentence except for certain third offenses. Second, the threat of jail time was counter to the goals of probation. The goal was to get youth offenders and young adults (18-21 year olds) in a supervised probation program with drug and alcohol oversight. Finally, with the imposition of a jail sentence, certain constitutional protections are triggered such as a right to a jury trial and the right to legal counsel. Collectively, these were believed to be counter to the actual goals of the probation process.

The Wyoming Supreme Court recently held that individuals **cannot be placed** on probation if they are not also facing a jail sentence. In other words, youth offenders (particularly those 18-20) must face jail time in order receive probation. We are working to amend Chapter 16 of the Gillette City Code to remedy this situation. Attached please find a proposed draft amendment to Chapter 16 which will be discussed during our September 5, 2017 pre-meeting. The proposed changes do impose jail time for certain offenses related to alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs. Unfortunately, this is the only means to keep probation (particularly supervised probation) as one of the sentencing options available to our municipal judges.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 16-1 OF THE GILLETTE CITY CODE TO AMEND SENTENCING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF GILLETTE CITY CODE, CITY ORDINANCE OR OTHER RULE OR REGULATION PROMULGATED BY THE CITY OF GILLETTE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF GILLETTE, WYOMING:

SECTION ONE. Section 16-1 of the Gillette City Code is amended to read as follows:

§16-1 Penalties.

A.

1. Penalties. Wherever in this Code, or in any ordinance of the City, or any rule or regulation promulgated by an officer or agency of the City under authority vested in him or it by law or ordinance, any act is prohibited or is declared to be unlawful or a misdemeanor or the doing of any act is required, or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful or a misdemeanor, the violation of any such provision of this Code, or any such ordinance, rule or regulation shall constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) to which may be added court costs, with the exception of Sections 16-1(A)(3) and/or 16-1(B) set forth herein.

Community service may also be ordered by the Court. Community Service performed will be credited at the prevailing Federal Minimum Wage. The total of fine plus Community Service credit hours, cannot exceed seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for any one conviction of an ordinance violation. Each day or part thereof, any violation of this code or any such ordinance, rule or regulation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

2. Probation. After conviction or plea of guilty for any of the offenses in Sections 16-1(A)(3) and/or 16-1(B) set forth herein, and following entry of the judgment of conviction, the Court may:

- (i) Suspend the imposition or execution of sentence and place the defendant on probation; or
- (ii) Impose a fine applicable to the offense and place the defendant on probation.

(iii) The Court may impose, and at any time modify, any condition of probation or suspension of sentence. Compliance with the recommendations contained within a substance abuse evaluation may be a condition of probation.

3. Substance Abuse Evaluation. Whenever any person pleads guilty to, or is found guilty of §3-2 or §3-6 of the Gillette City Code, or §12-6-101(a) of the Wyoming Statutes as adopted by §3-12 of the Gillette City Code, for possession or use of any alcoholic or malt beverage or use of any controlled substance as defined in Wyoming Statutes they may be ordered to attend a substance abuse evaluation, as determined by the Municipal Judge.

B. In the case of a conviction on the charge of a violation of any of the following offenses:

3-1	Public Intoxication.
3-2	Minor in Possession.
3-3	Minor in Licensed Building.
14-19	Marijuana Use and Possession.
14-2	Assault and Battery.
14-23	Same - resisting arrest.
§ 31-5-229, Wyo. Statutes, as adopted by § 11-1 of the Gillette City Code	Reckless Driving

the offender shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment of a term of up to ninety (90) days, and a fine not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) plus Court Costs.

Upon conviction of any other sections of the Gillette City Code the offender shall be punished by a fine not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) to which may be added court costs, including a Court Automation Fee, unless a lesser punishment is specifically established elsewhere in a particular section of the Gillette City Code.

SECTION TWO. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon publication.





Spotlight: Captain Ryan Fox

Where are you from? I was born in Billings, MT via Lovell, WY due to my twin brother and I being two months premature. Raised for the most part in Gillette since 1990.

Which secondary (high) school did you attend? I attended and graduated from Campbell County High School. I played four years of soccer for the Camels. During my high school years, I worked part-time for the Rourke Ranch south of Gillette as well as a Cadet for the CCFD during the summer months.



Do you have any post-secondary education? I attended Casper College in 1998 and graduated with an Associate Degree in Fire Science in 2000. After Casper College, I attended Black Hills State University and Gillette College before finally graduating from Upper Iowa University with a Bachelor degree in Public Administration. In 2014, I graduated with my Master's degree in Organization Leadership from Regis University. I am currently in the process of completing my 3rd year of the Executive Fire Officer Program at the National Fire Academy. In September, I start a nine-month program called Gillette Area Leadership Institute.

During my college years, I worked as a seasonal firefighter on the Bighorn National Forest for two years as well as two years on Logan Interagency Hotshot Crew in Utah.

What has kept you located in Gillette? Growing up in Gillette and becoming a fire cadet at the age of 13, I knew that I wanted to eventually become a career firefighter and stay in Gillette. When I started with the CCFD at a Cadet, there were not any full-time firefighters. They were all firefighter/mechanics that started in the shop and eventually worked their way into other positions outside of maintenance. The majority of my family lives in the area and my wife's immediate family also live in the area. We have no reason to live anywhere else!

Before becoming a firefighter, what were some of your other jobs? I worked on a cattle ranch during high school and as a seasonal firefighter with the USFS. I have also worked for Firemaster installing fire suppression systems on large pieces of mining equipment.

Why and when did you decide to become a career firefighter? From a young age, I knew that I wanted to be a firefighter. When my family moved to Gillette around 1990 my father carpooled to work with the Station #11 Fire Chief named Jimmy Andrews. My uncle Duane Myers was also a volunteer firefighter at Station #1 and Station #3 as well as being a Command Officer in the CCFD. It was not long before my father joined up at station #11 as a volunteer firefighter, and then became Captain until he retired around 2002. The CCFD Cadet program was started around 1990, I joined up in 1993 with my brother and long-time friends; Ryan Warne and Chris Beltz. Ryan Warne and I would later be hired on the same day as career firefighters in 2002 for the CCFD.

Spotlight: Captain Ryan Fox Continued

How long have you worked for CCFD? Do you have any experience with other fire departments? I joined up as a cadet in 1993 for the CCFD. In 1997, I was brought on to the department as a volunteer firefighter. In 2002, I was hired full-time as a career firefighter, this October will mark 20 years of service as a firefighter not counting my time as a cadet. The USFS is considered the largest fire department in the world, and I spent four seasons working all over the country from 1998-2001.

Is there a particular aspect of firefighting that you enjoy more than others? I enjoy most aspects of firefighting; the fieldwork is exciting and it builds camaraderie. It's the paperwork that follows the incident that can be tiresome.

Do you have a significant other and/or children? I married my high school sweetheart (Rachel) in 2003, we have been together since 1997. In 2005, we were blessed with our first daughter Emily. In 2008, our second daughter Jenna arrived to complete the family. We also have a cat named Wally, dog named Zoey, and a guinea pig named Buttercup (my kids love animals). My wife works in the oil and gas industry as contractor managing daily operations and compliance for several small oil and gas investment companies.



History– 4th of July Fire 2000



Also at this time, SCBA was seldom used. I think we only had three of them.



Rawhide Mine Structure Fire

On August 20th at approximately 8:15pm, firefighters were dispatched to the Rawhide Mine for reports of a structure fire. Personnel arrived on scene to find a plant sampling structure on fire. This fire has been very challenging to extinguish as both Rawhide Mine Rescue and CCFD remain on scene this morning, continuing to battle this very difficult fire. The cause of the fire remains under investigation.

On August 28th at approximately 5:45pm, CCFD was dispatched to the area of Glock Ave. for reports of a grass fire that was threatening structures. Fire crews arrived on scene to a rapidly growing fire. CCFD was assisted by several outside resources including local homeowners with private equipment, Campbell County Road and Bridge, BLM, and Air Attack out of Casper, WY. Although several were threatened, no structures were lost in the fire. The fire is estimated at 418 acres per Air Attack flying the boundaries of the fire.

When laundering your PPE, you must NOT neglect your helmet and boots!




Basic Boot and Helmet Care and Cleaning

- Soiled boots and helmets may be cleaned with a soft cloth and warm water, gently scrubbing at soiled areas. Following the washing procedure, rinse the footwear and helmet thoroughly. Avoid using any soap or detergents, as this will reduce the water resistance of the leather on boots. Ensure you wash your shroud and wipe the suspension system down with a wet wipe or cloth.
- More persistent stains on boots may be treated with a silicone liquid; however, be sure the leather is dry before applying this method. Follow any cleaning with a good rinse in clear water to remove any cleaning agents.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

CAPRESE CHICKEN RECIPE (THE NOVICE CHEF)

YIELD: 4 SERVINGS; PREP TIME:10 MINUTES; COOK
TIME:20 MINUTES; TOTAL TIME:30 MINUTES

Caprese Chicken: chicken breasts are topped with garlic cherry tomatoes, mozzarella, basil and balsamic vinegar to create this one pan, 30 minute dinner.

INGREDIENTS:

4 skinless chicken breasts
kosher salt & freshly ground black pepper
2 tablespoons olive oil, divided
3 large garlic cloves, minced
2 pints cherry tomatoes, halved
10 large basil leaves, finely chopped
8 oz fresh buffalo mozzarella, sliced in 1/2 inch thick slices
balsamic vinegar, to taste

DIRECTIONS:

Salt and pepper both sides of the chicken breasts and set aside.

In a large sauté pan over medium-high heat, warm 1 tablespoon olive oil. Add chicken, cover pan, and cook for about 10 minutes. Flip chicken breasts and continue cooking until the chicken is cooked thoroughly (or has reached an internal temp of 165°F).

Remove chicken and place on a plate and cover with foil. Add remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil to sauté pan. Add garlic and cook for about 1 minute, or until fragrant, scraping up all the little bits of chicken left in the pan.

Add tomatoes and continue sautéing until tomatoes skin starts to soften/wrinkle, about 5 minutes. Stir in basil and quickly place chicken back in pan. Top each chicken breast with 2 slices of mozzarella. Cover pan with lid and let the mozzarella melt, about 1-2 minutes. Drizzle with a splash of balsamic vinegar and serve immediately!


recipe note: Balsamic vinegar comes in many forms. I really recommend a higher quality one - it truly does make a difference. A low quality balsamic vinegar is very thin - like water. A higher quality one is slightly thicker (not as thick as balsamic glaze, but somewhere in the middle of the two).

My favorite side dishes for this Caprese Chicken are some buttery noodles (with a squeeze of lemon) and possibly some garlic bread if we are feeling extra carby. Of course – the garlic bread makes it much less healthy...but who cares. It's delicious.

If we are really watching our carbs, I like to make this with mashed cauliflower and a side arugula salad. I hope you enjoy this dish as much as we have over the years!


