





Public Notice

In accordance with Chapter 6 Section 3 of the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality Land Quality Coal Rules and Regulations, Blackjewel L.L.C. hereby announces its intention to detonate explosives during its mining operations at the Belle Ayr Mine, MSHA I.D. Number 48-00732, Permit Number 214-T9, located in Townships 47 and 48 North, Range 71 West, and Townships 47 and 48 North, Range 72 West, in Campbell County in the State of Wyoming. Blasting will occur 18 miles southeast of Gillette, Wyoming at the following location(s):

T48N, R71W, 6th PM: S ½ of Section 19, W ½, NWNE, SWNE, NWSE, and NWSW of Section 30, NWNE of Section 32 and NENE of Section 34.

T48N, R72W, 6th PM: The SESE and NESE of Section 24, and NESE, SENE, and NENE of Section 25.

Any blasting done at the above location(s) will occur Monday through Sunday from sunrise to sunset, beginning February 18, 2019, and continuing through February 17, 2020, except in conditions where operator or public safety requires unscheduled detonation. All standard warning and safety procedures will be followed during such unscheduled detonation.

Access to blasting areas will be controlled by mine personnel guarding access roads to the blasting area prior to the start of blasting. Control of access to the blasting area will be in effect until an inspection can be made and access to and travel in the area can safely resume. For one minute prior to detonation of a charge an audible warning signal will be sounded consisting of a one-minute continuous siren. When detonation of explosives has concluded, an all-clear signal consisting of a ten-second, alternating siren will be sounded. If blasting at Belle Ayr Mine near Highway 59 requires temporarily delaying traffic on the highway, such traffic delay shall normally be limited to a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes. Belle Ayr will have flag persons on the highway implementing traffic control. Traffic control points may be moved to accommodate pit configuration. Warning signs will be located ahead of the point where traffic is stopped. The flag persons will be equipped with two-way communications with the persons responsible for blasting. Should any emergency vehicle need to proceed, that vehicle will be accommodated up to the moment of the blast. Blasting near Highway 59 and the potential for traffic control on Highway 59 will normally occur between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. That time period may be temporarily expanded without notice due to wind direction or mine schedules or other mining considerations.

In accordance with Chapter 6 Section 2(a), a pre-blasting survey will be conducted at the request of a resident or owner of a man-made dwelling or structure that is located within one-half mile of the blasting locations described above. Storm Event Overview:

The Streets day crew leader called out the crew at 9:00 a.m. on 12/30/2018 as snow mixed with rain was beginning to build up on the streets. Heavy snow showers fell on and off through the day keeping the crew working on priority streets and trouble areas.

Night crew took over at 7:00 p.m. 12/30/18 as temperatures dropped and winds increased causing blizzard conditions at times. The night crew struggled through the night to make any significant progress on priority streets due to the snowfall and high winds.

New Year's Eve morning, 12/31/2018, brought continued snow and high winds and a level two snow emergency was declared. Solid Waste service was suspended because the streets and cul-de-sacs were impassable for the Solid Waste trucks. Parks and Solid Waste drivers joined the Streets crew at 4:00 a.m. working into subdivisions and addressing trouble areas. As the day progressed, snow began to taper off and the day crew was able to work through most of the priority routes. Since weather conditions were improving, the level two snow emergency was lowered to a level one around 6:15 p.m. Night crew worked New Year's Eve finishing priority routes and trouble areas, then working through subdivisions.

New Year's Day dawned with the subdivisions badly drifted, with only basic driving lane open. The priority streets were relatively open, but a few areas were drifted with only one lane open each direction. Crews divided their efforts between widening priority routes and clearing subdivision streets. The plowing efforts were directed at clearing priority streets and opening the subdivisions for the Solid Waste truck routes. By late afternoon on New Year's Day all subdivisions were marginally passable the snow event was ended at 5:00 p.m. Public Works crews then continued to work on ice and snow clean up in subdivisions removing piles, ice and windrows to help road conditions.

doesn't have is much experience running a small business, and that's what led him to become the first Outreach Member of the FUEL Business Incubator.

"I have been interested in the lunch & learns and have been going to them and the different programs that are offered. That's always been a benefit," Bryan said. While he primarily works from his home, he said he became an Outreach Member because "it gives me a professional environment to meet with clients and a great place to network with other professionals. Along with

the informative seminars that the incubator offers, another inclusion is the membership to the Chamber, which I'm looking forward to be involved with. It's a perfect fit for me."

Through Omni-Digital-Productions, Bryan provides a full range of video production and multimedia services. It's a field he's been interested in--and working in--since he was very young.

"Growing up in Gillette, I got into music at an early age," Bryan said. "Part of that was learning techniques of how to record and produce music. The name 'Omni-Digital-Productions' is derived from the omnidirectional microphones that pick up sound with equal gain from all sides or directions. This 'Omni' business concept in my point of view works well as a service I can provide to others to help sell their products/services or events. 'Inform * Stimulate * Excel' is the Omni-Digital-Productions slogan."

Bryan started his higher education working on a music performance degree at Casper College, but after a year, he transferred to Full Sail University in Florida where he earned an Associate of Science in Recording Arts in 1998. That opened doors to the career path he's been on since.

Bryan's professional career kicked off in Orlando, where he worked for several companies including Soundelux, Technomedia Solutions, Convergence Film & Video and EA Sports doing audio/video production and multimedia work. He had some big-name clients, including Disney and Universal Studios (Orlando & Japan). He also has multiple film credits on IMDB.com.

Bryan eventually went out on his own doing audio and video freelance work and moved back to Gillette. "I have built a big network of multimedia professionals and so I have been fortunate enough to continue doing projects remotely when I can," he said.

In 2015, Bryan formed Omni-Digital-Productions, but it was a sideline to a full-time job that he needed to pay the bills. "I thought when I first got back to Gillette that there wasn't really a market for these services that I went to school for and worked in for more than ten years," he said. "Then I started noticing that there could potentially be a demand for companies or individuals needing video and audio production for their businesses. Essentially, I'd be providing a service for services or products that people want to market."

Bryan went full-time with his production company earlier this year and plans to initially focus on learning how to run a business. By next year, he hopes to start hiring some employees and by the end of his second year have three to five staff members.
