RE: Planned Transmission Pole Repair at WYODAK on October 30, 2019

Following the severe wind storm in late August, the Electrical Services Division noticed a City electric transmission pole that was “leaning”. This pole is located in the fenced area of Black Hills’ Neil Simpson I Switchyard at the WYODAK Power Complex.

During the past month we have been working with WYODAK and Black Hills personnel to schedule a time and date to straighten our leaning pole. In order to access the yard and terminate power to make the necessary repairs, electric service to the WYODAK mine needs to be interrupted.

Based on our conversations with WYODAK and Black Hills, the shutdown is planned for Wednesday, October 30. After power is terminated within the switchyard, the City’s Electrical Services Division will straighten the leaning pole. Once the pole is straightened, electric service will be restored to the mine. We anticipate a six-hour window from 9 am to 3 pm when power will be terminated to make the necessary repairs.

The work scheduled on October 30 will have *no effect* on City electric customers.

Wyoming Cost of Living Index for the Second Quarter of 2019

CHEYENNE - The State of Wyoming, Economic Analysis Division has released the second quarter of 2019 Wyoming Cost of Living Index (WCLI). Inflation is reported for the State, by consumer category, and for five regions in the State. Inflation measures year-over-year price changes in six consumer categories. The inflation figures for the second quarter of 2019 represent the percent change in the price level of a standard basket of selected consumer items priced in the second quarter of 2019, compared with the price level of the same goods recorded one year ago (second quarter of 2018).

- All Items Statewide inflation 2.0%
- Statewide inflation by consumer category:
 - Medical 5.0%
 - Apparel 3.6%
 - Housing 2.7%
 - Food 2.3%
 - Recreation & Personal Care -0.3%
 - Transportation -0.8%
- Regional inflation rates:
 - Northeast 2.3%
 - Central 2.3%
 - Southwest 2.2%
 - Northwest 1.9%
 - Southeast 1.7%

Nationally, the inflation rate from June 2018 to June 2019 was 1.6 percent (CPI-U), as reported by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) in the Consumer Price Index.

The Wyoming Cost of Living Index (WCLI) consists of two parts, **Inflation**, which measures year-over-year change (annual) and the **Comparative Cost of Living Index** which compares each county's cost of living in one period (not over time) to the statewide average. The Comparative Cost of Living Index represents each county's price level compared to the statewide average (100) during a single time period, in this case, the second quarter of 2019.

For the second quarter of 2019, the Comparative Cost of Living Index ranked Teton (161) as the county with the highest **All Items** value, which indicates that the cost of living in Teton County was estimated 61 percent higher than the statewide average in the quarter.

Comparative Cost of Living Index values for all counties in Wyoming are listed in Table 1 on page 3. Movement in ranking from a previous survey does not indicate that the price level has increased or decreased in a particular county. Instead, these values reflect relative price levels in each county, *at the time of data collection*, compared with the statewide average of 100. Comparative Cost of Living Index data were also produced by consumer category for every county.

Survey Methodology

The WCLI is produced biannually, the second quarter and fourth quarter. Price data are collected in twenty-eight cities and towns in Wyoming and the data are used to build a Comparative Cost of Living Index by county and to estimate overall inflation rates for Wyoming and the five designated regions of the State. A map of the twenty-eight cities where price data were collected is on page 4.

Communities across the State are included in the WCLI based on the following criteria: First, the largest city or town in each county is priced; additionally, prices are collected in any city or town with populations greater than 5,000 or in cases of a city or town having at least 80 percent of a county's largest community's population. In counties where only one community was priced, those prices were used to represent the entire county. In counties where two communities were surveyed, a population-weighted average of the prices for the two communities was used for the entire county. In addition, starting with the second quarter of 2003 WCLI report, Afton, in Lincoln County, was added as a sampling point through legislative action in 2003. Kemmerer is still priced. Afton and Kemmerer report separate Comparative Cost of Living Index numbers. Beginning with the second quarter of 2004, Afton, has been included in the inflation calculations.

The 140 consumer items surveyed were aggregated into six categories, which were then weighted using item weights from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), reflective of their overall importance in the average consumer's budget. These categories, and their respective weight components, include Housing (48.4%), Transportation (16.3%), Food (13.3%), Recreation & Personal Care (9.5%), Medical (8.7%), and Apparel (3.8%).

The data are weighted by population to more accurately represent the price changes experienced by the majority of consumers in Wyoming.



Tips to Prevent Frozen Pipes

As temperatures drop, deep frost and freeze-thaw cycles can expand and contract materials; causing stresses on pipes and creating cracks. To avoid the expense and inconvenience of frozen, broken water pipes, the City of Gillette Water Division recommends the following tips.

As temperatures drop, deep frost and freeze-thaw cycles can expand and contract materials; causing stresses on pipes and creating cracks. To avoid the expense and inconvenience of frozen, broken water pipes, the City of Gillette Water Division recommends the following tips:

- Keep kitchen/bathroom cabinet doors open to allow warm air circulation.
- Find the farthest place where your water enters the house and open the faucet a crack. A very slow drip will keep water moving and reduce the chance that pipes will freeze. Place a bucket underneath to use the water again.
- Insulate pipes that may be vulnerable to the cold or have caused problems before.
- Consider installing "heat tape" or similar materials on exposed water pipes.
- If you have an attached garage, keep its door shut. Occasionally plumbing is routed through the unheated garages leaving it more vulnerable to winter's worst conditions.
- Know the location of your water shut-off valve and test it regularly. Be prepared.
- Disconnect, drain and store all garden hoses.
- Dewater your sprinkler system to avoid cracks and leaks. Turn off the water to the sprinkler system and use compressed air to blow out the remaining water.
- Drain outdoor faucets and exposed pipes.

If pipes start to leak, turn the water off at the main valve to the home or business. This will help prevent leaking water from damaging the building. The pipe will need to be repaired before turning the water back on. If you need assistance locating the main water valve or shutting water off to a building, please call the [Water Division](#) at 686-5276. Keep warm and protect those pipes.

Storm Event Overview:

On 10/20/2019 at 11:00 a.m. the Streets on call person was called in to address slick bridges caused by wet snow. Snowfall rapidly increased and a day crew was assembled with people from Streets, Parks and Solid Waste.

The day crew applied material and began plowing priority streets and trouble areas. Heavy snowfall mixed with rain continued through the afternoon keeping the crew focused on plowing the priority streets, subdivision streets and trouble areas.

At about 5:30 the weather cleared and the day crew finished up the remaining subdivision streets and checked trouble areas for slushy spots and drifts. The streets were melting off and the event was ended at 6:00 p.m.
