Governor Gordon and State Health Officer issue statewide closure order for public spaces

CHEYENNE, Wyo. – Governor Mark Gordon has endorsed a decision by the Wyoming State Health Officer to close public places for a two-week period to help slow the community spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).

The closure order extends through April 3 and includes schools, theaters, bars, nightclubs, coffee shops, employee cafeterias, self-serve buffets, salad bars, unpackaged self-serve food services, gyms, conference rooms and museums.

“This Governor has never been inclined to overstep local authority, but these are unprecedented times. It is critical that there is uniformity across the state in how social distancing measures are implemented,”

Governor Mark Gordon said.

“Wyoming, like all Americans, must commit to reducing the strain on our healthcare system. These are hard measures and they will be difficult for employees and businesses alike, but they are warranted.”

Restaurants will be closed to dine-in food service, but may remain open for curbside take-out or drive-through food service. Under the order, childcare centers will be closed except for those serving essential personnel.

Dr. Alexia Harrist, state health officer and state epidemiologist with the Wyoming Department of Health, said “We realize this action will be very difficult for many of our residents. But it is an important step to help them avoid becoming ill and to help them avoid spreading COVID-19 to those who are most vulnerable. We should all work together to help keep our friends and neighbors safe.”

Wyoming currently has 18 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and the Wyoming Public Health laboratory has completed nearly 300 tests, as of March 19, 2020. Additional testing is occurring at commercial laboratories. A nationwide shortage of testing supplies is impacting Wyoming, like all states. Social distancing measures are the most effective means of slowing the spread of COVID-19, according to Dr. Harrist.

While most individuals will likely not experience serious illness related to COVID-19, older residents and people with certain health conditions put them at higher risk of developing a serious or life-threatening illness.

Governor Gordon and First Lady Jennie Gordon will host a fireside chat at 6:30 pm tonight to communicate directly with Wyoming citizens about COVID-19. The chat will be streamed live on the Governor’s Facebook page.

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**STATEWIDE PUBLIC HEALTH ORDER CLOSING BARS, RESTAURANTS,
THEATERS, GYMNASIUMS, CHILD CARE FACILITIES, K-12 SCHOOLS,
COLLEGES, UNIVERSITIES, AND TRADE SCHOOLS STATEWIDE**

In an effort to stop the spread of the coronavirus (COVID-19), the Wyoming Department of Health finds it necessary to protect the health of the public by implementing emergency measures to close all restaurants, bars, theaters, gymnasiums, child care facilities, K-12 schools, colleges, universities, and trade schools, in the State of Wyoming, with certain exceptions. This Order is effective immediately, and shall remain in effect until April 3, 2020.

FINDINGS

1. COVID-19 was first detected in Wuhan, China in 2019, and since then has spread to over 60 countries including the United States. There are 18 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Wyoming as of March 18, 2020, as well as the presence of community spread. It is expected that more cases will be diagnosed.
2. COVID-19 is a respiratory illness, transmitted through person-to-person contact or by contact with surfaces contaminated with the virus. Persons infected with COVID-19 may become symptomatic two to fourteen days after exposure. The symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, and shortness of breath. In some cases, COVID-19 can result in severe disease including hospitalization, admission to an intensive care unit, and death, especially among older adults and persons with serious underlying health conditions.
3. The World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a worldwide pandemic as of March 11, 2020.
4. On March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency concerning the coronavirus, specifically stating that, in “December 2019 a novel (new) coronavirus known as SARS-CoV-2 (“the virus”) was first detected in Wuhan, Hubei Province, People’s Republic of China, causing outbreaks of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) that has now spread globally [...] The spread of COVID-19 within our Nation’s communities threatens to strain our Nation’s healthcare systems. [...] Additional measures [...] are needed to successfully contain and combat the virus in the United States.”
5. On March 13, 2020, Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon declared a State of Emergency and Public Health Emergency in the State of Wyoming, stating that on March 11, 2020, an individual within the State of Wyoming tested presumptive positive for COVID-19 and the State of Wyoming is experiencing a public health emergency in response to the evolving COVID-19 outbreak.
6. Governor Gordon’s Declaration of a State of Emergency and Public Health Emergency directs the Wyoming Department of Health to take all appropriate and necessary actions, and that in the judgment of the Director of the Wyoming Department of Health, any actions necessary should be taken to provide aid to those locations where there is a threat or danger to public health, safety, and welfare.
7. The guidelines issued from the White House on March 16, 2020, specify that with evidence of community transmission within a state, bars, restaurants, food courts, gyms, and other indoor and outdoor venues where groups of people congregate should be closed.
8. A significant number of Wyoming citizens are at risk of serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19. Although most individuals who contract COVID-19 do not become seriously ill, people with mild symptoms, and even asymptomatic persons with COVID-19, place other vulnerable members of the public at significant risk.

9. Counties in Wyoming have requested orders of this kind following the White House guidelines, and the best manner of protecting the health of the citizens of Wyoming is through a consistent order spanning the entire State.
10. A large number of persons with serious infections has the ability to compromise the ability of healthcare systems in Wyoming to deliver the necessary healthcare to the public.
11. Wyoming Statute §§ 35-1-240(a)(i) and (iv) provides all the rights and powers for the Wyoming Department of Health, through the State Health Officer, Dr. Alexia Harrist, M.D., PhD, or under her directive through other employees of the Wyoming Department of Health, to close theaters, schools, and other public places, and forbid public gatherings when necessary to protect the public health.
12. In addition to the above findings, stopping the spread of COVID-19 includes washing hands often, practicing social distancing by avoiding close contact with others, staying at least six feet away from someone who is ill or showing signs of illness, avoiding touching your face, eyes, nose and mouth, and covering your cough or sneeze into your elbow or by using a tissue.

ORDER


1. The following places of public accommodation are ordered closed to ingress, egress, use, and occupancy by members of the public:
 - a. Restaurants, food courts, cafes, coffeehouses, and other similar places of public accommodation offering food or beverage for on-premises consumption;
 - b. Bars, taverns, brew pubs, breweries, microbreweries, distillery pubs, wineries, tasting rooms, special licensees, clubs, and other places of public accommodation offering alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption;
 - c. Cigar bars;
 - d. Gymnasiums; and
 - e. Movie and performance theaters, opera houses, concert halls, and music halls.
2. The following conditions apply to places of public accommodation subject to this Order:
 - a. Places of public accommodation are encouraged to offer food and beverage using delivery service, window service, walk-up service, drive-through service, or drive-up service, and to use precautions in doing so to mitigate the potential transmission of COVID-19, including social distancing. Online and telephonic credit card transactions are strongly encouraged (e.g. Venmo, Squarecash, Googlepay, Apple Pay and similar payment apps).
 - b. Staff who handle cash or credit cards may not be involved in the preparation, handling, or delivery of food.
 - c. In offering food or beverage, a place of public accommodation may permit up to five members of the public at one time in the place of public accommodation for the purpose of picking up their food or beverage orders, so long as those individuals are at least six feet apart from one another while on premises.
 - d. For hotel restaurants, food items may only be delivered as room service or as described above.
 - e. Management shall ensure, on a daily basis, that no employee who presents symptoms of illness will be permitted to work.

3. For clarity, this Order does not apply to any of the following:
 - a. Places of public accommodation that offer food and beverage not for on-premises consumption, including grocery stores, markets, retail stores that offer food, convenience stores, pharmacies, drug stores, and food pantries;
 - b. Room service in hotels;
 - c. Health care facilities, residential care facilities, congregate care facilities, and juvenile justice facilities;
 - d. Crisis shelters or similar institutions;
 - e. Airport concessionaires; and
 - f. Any emergency facilities necessary for the response to the events surrounding the public health emergency and state of emergency caused by COVID-19.
4. All child care centers and home daycares are ordered closed, subject to the following:
 - a. Child care centers or home daycares that provide care for children of essential personnel may continue to operate to provide child care for children of essential personnel. Essential personnel includes:
 - i. Staff and providers of childcare and education services, including custodial and kitchen staff and other support staff, who do not do their work remotely;
 - ii. Providers of healthcare including, but not limited to, employees of clinics, hospitals, nursing homes, long-term care and post-acute care facilities, respite houses, designated agencies, emergency medical services, as well as necessary custodial, kitchen, administrative, and other support staff;
 - iii. Criminal justice personnel including those in law enforcement, courts, and correctional services;
 - iv. Public health employees;
 - v. Firefighters, Wyoming National Guard personnel called to duty for responding to COVID-19, and other first responders;
 - vi. State employees determined to be essential for response to the COVID-19 crisis;
 - vii. Active duty military staff;
 - viii. Pharmacy staff;
 - ix. Foster families with children through grade 8;
 - x. 2-1-1 and 9-1-1 call center staff; critical infrastructure and utility workers, including electrical, plumbing, telecommunications, water, and wastewater operators, workers, and staff;
 - xi. State, municipal, and commercial public works and sanitation crews;
 - xii. Grocery and food supply workers;
 - xiii. Supply chain, postal, and delivery drivers and warehouse workers;

- xiv. Manufacturers of medical devices, equipment, testing equipment, and supplies;
 - xv. and fuel distribution workers.
- b. In circumstances where a child care center or home daycare remains open, the center or home is required to have fewer than 10 people in a room or together at any time, including for meals or recreation.
 - c. Further, a child care center or home daycare that remains open is required to follow all health guidelines from the CDC and Wyoming Department of Health for limiting the risk of transmission of COVID-19. to the extent possible when caring for children.
 - d. As childcare is a critical part of the infrastructure of Wyoming, allowing essential systems to function, in the event a county health officer wants to close a childcare facility under the direction and supervision of the State Health Officer, the County Health Officer shall work with local childcare providers to make available limited childcare services for essential personnel, as described above.
5. All K-12 schools shall dismiss students until no sooner than April 3, 2020, to the extent any school in Wyoming has not already done so. Administrative staff and teachers may continue to work in school buildings to facilitate distance learning or to complete administrative tasks. Food may still be prepared to be made available to those in need, as directed by school superintendents. Classes may still be offered online at the discretion of the school.
 6. All colleges, universities, and trade schools shall not hold in person classes until no sooner than April 3, 2020. Administrative staff and teachers may continue to work in facility buildings to facilitate distance learning or to complete administrative tasks. Food may still be prepared to be made available to those in need. Classes may still be offered online at the discretion of the college, university or trade school.
 7. This Order supersedes all previous individual county orders authorized by the Wyoming State Health Officer under Wyoming Statute § 35-1-240(a)(iv). To the extent the county order is more restrictive, the more restrictive provisions still apply.
 8. Exceptions to the public accommodation sections above (paragraphs 1-3) may be granted, at the discretion of the County Health Officer, under the direction and supervision of the State Health Officer, if the business can demonstrate, in writing, to the County Health Officer that they will limit customers within the business to no more than ten at any given time, that at least 6 feet of space will be maintained between customers at all times, and that effective cleaning will be performed between customers.

As the State Health Officer, I specifically deem this order necessary to protect the public health. See Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 35-1-240(a)(iv). I will reassess the necessity of this order as appropriate to do so and according to accepted epidemiological and medical standards. Any person or legal entity that violates this Order shall be subject to criminal prosecution under Wyo. Stat. Ann. §§ 35-1-105 and -106.

Statement read by Mayor Louise Carter-King at March 17, 2020 City Council Meeting

Good evening everyone. I would like to take a moment to discuss the steps the City has taken to help prevent the spread of the virus, and how we are maintaining critical City services.

As many of you know, City offices are essentially closed to public access. We are doing this not only for the health and safety of our employees but also for the health and safety of our residents and visitors. However, we are still operating as much as possible.

If you have questions for City Administration or members of the City Council, you can call our office at 686-5203 or you can find our contact information on the City website, www.gillettewy.gov.

All meetings of our Citizen Advisory Boards have been canceled until further notice.

Municipal Court operations have been suspended until further notice. For those that have had their court date suspended, you will receive information in the mail for the rescheduled date and time when that has been determined. Fines may still be made over the phone.

Our City Attorney will be available via phone and email.

The Engineering Division will be communicating via phone and email to make sure that contractors are able to continue their work.

Building Inspection will continue to issue permits and make inspections in limited situations and for specific reasons. They will conduct inspections making the best use of social distancing and minimizing contact to keep ongoing construction projects moving forward.

If you have need for Geographic Information Systems services, they can be reached by phone or email.

Customer service is continuing to operate. We ask that our utility customers pay their bills online or over the phone. If that is not possible, payments can be dropped off using the dropbox or using the drive through during normal business hours. We will not be disconnecting anyone's services until further notice. We will continue to send out utility bills and reminder notices. We will not be assessing late fees.

The City Clerk will be on duty during this time. However the City will not be accepting most applications for things such as liquor license transfers, catering permits, merchant permits and similar interactions for the foreseeable future.

The Human Resources Department will be staffed but will not be conducting job interviews. They will accept applications for employment via US Mail and electronically through email.

The Gillette Police Department will continue to respond to calls for service. They will do their best to maintain safe distancing when appropriate. Fingerprinting services have been suspended as a preventative measure. Our Community Service Officers will continue to provide VIN verifications, taking appropriate safety precautions.

Animal Control will continue to operate but there won't be any animal adoptions. If you have an animal that was picked up by an Animal Control Officer, you can call and make arrangements to pick your animal up. Please do not go to the Shelter without calling first.

Our Solid Waste Division will be running routes as normal. Please have your roll outs to the curb by 7 a.m.

Our Streets Division will continue to plow snow when we have a snow event.

Each of our Utilities Divisions will continue to make sure we can turn on our lights, get water from our taps, and flush our toilets. They have taken measures to protect themselves to make sure they can respond when needed. Our Electrical Services Division has already responded to two power outages quickly and safely.

Our divisions that support internal operations, like IT, Fleet, and Building Maintenance are also on duty and making sure that requests for their services are responded to quickly and efficiently while limiting face to face contact.

As you can see, the City is taking this pandemic very seriously. We ask that everyone else make every effort to help prevent the spread of this disease to vulnerable populations.

We also want you to think about the social service agencies that are still assisting those that need help with food and shelter. The Council of Community Services is in dire need of food for their pantry. The best way to help them is with a monetary donation but the next time you are out shopping, please pick up a few extra items for the food pantry. Gillette and Campbell County always come through for our neighbors when the chips are down. Let's do it again.

The United States Air Force (USAF) is issuing this notice to inform state and local agencies of its intent to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the B-21 Main Operating Base 1 (MOB 1) Beddown at Dyess Air Force Base (AFB), Texas or Ellsworth AFB, South Dakota. The Air Force's notice of intent (NOI) to prepare an EIS and hold public scoping meetings was published in the Federal Register on March 6, 2020. The EIS will assess the potential environmental consequences of the proposal to beddown the Department of Defense's new bomber aircraft, the B-21 "Raider," which will eventually replace existing B-1 and B-2 bomber aircraft. The EIS is being prepared in accordance with National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969; 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Parts 1500-1508, the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations for implementing NEPA; and the Air Force Environmental Impact Analysis Process (EIAP) [32 CFR Part 989].

This notice also serves to invite early public and agency participation in determining the scope of environmental issues and alternatives to be analyzed in the EIS and to identify and eliminate from detailed study the issues which are not significant. To effectively define the full range of issues and concerns to be evaluated in the EIS, the Air Force is soliciting scoping comments from interested local, state and federal agencies, interested American Indian tribes, and interested members of the public.

The beddown of the B-21 will take place through a series of three Main Operating Bases (MOB), referred to as MOB 1, MOB 2, and MOB 3. The Air Force proposes to beddown MOB 1, which includes B-21 Operational Squadrons, a B-21 Formal Training Unit (FTU), and a Weapons Generation Facility (WGF) in this EIS. MOB 2 and MOB 3 beddown locations would be evaluated in future NEPA analyses, after the location for MOB 1 is chosen. The B-21 will operate under the direction of the Air Force Global Strike Command. The B-21 will have both conventional and nuclear roles and will be capable of penetrating and surviving in advanced air defense environments. It is projected to enter service in the 2020s, and the Air Force intends to have at least 100 B-21 aircraft built.

The purpose of the Proposed Action is to implement the goals of the National Defense Strategy by modernizing the U.S. bomber fleet capabilities. The B-21 Raider is being developed to carry conventional payloads and to support the nuclear triad by providing a visible and flexible nuclear deterrent capability that will assure allies and partners through the United States' commitment to international treaties. The B-21 will provide the only stealth bomber capability and capacity needed to deter, and if necessary, defeat our adversaries in an era of renewed great power competition. MOB 1

will support training of crewmembers and personnel in the operation and maintenance of the B-21 aircraft in an appropriate geographic location that can provide sufficient airfield, facilities, infrastructure, and airspace to support the B-21 training and operations.

The EIS will analyze Dyess AFB and Ellsworth AFB as basing alternatives for MOB 1 for the Proposed Action, as well as a No Action Alternative. The basing alternatives were developed to minimize mission impact, maximize facility reuse, minimize cost, and reduce overhead, as well as leverage the strengths of each base to optimize the B-21 beddown strategy. The potential impacts of the alternatives and the No Action Alternative that the EIS may examine include impacts to land use, airspace, safety, noise, hazardous materials and solid waste, physical resources (including earth and water resources), air quality, transportation, cultural resources, biological resources, socioeconomics, and environmental justice.

The Air Force will be holding public scoping meetings in areas potentially impacted by the proposal. During the public scoping meetings, the Air Force will provide additional information about the B-21 MOB 1 Beddown EIS. The purpose of the meetings and the scoping period is to further solicit input regarding the scope of issues to be addressed and identify environmental issues to be analyzed in depth. Written comments received by the Air Force during the public scoping period will be considered in the preparation of the Draft EIS. Scoping comments may be submitted to the Air Force at the planned public scoping meetings, via the public website (www.B21EIS.com), or mailed. Comments will be accepted at any time during the Environmental Impact Analysis Process (EIAP). However, to ensure the Air Force has sufficient time to consider public input in the preparation of the Draft EIS, scoping comments must be submitted no later than April 24, 2020.

DATES: The Air Force plans to hold six public scoping meetings from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on the dates and at the locations listed below. Local notices announcing scheduled dates, locations, and addresses for each public scoping meeting will also be published in the Rapid City Journal and Black Hills Pioneer newspapers in South Dakota, the Abilene Reporter News, and The Wylie News newspapers in Texas, as well as the Native Sun News, Indian Country Today, and the Original Briefs tribal newspapers, a minimum of fifteen (15) days prior to each meeting.







Peabody Caballo Mining, LLC of St. Louis, MO has applied for a coal mining permit renewal from the Land Quality Division of the Department of Environmental Quality for the State of Wyoming. The coal mining permit area is located in portions or all of: Section 19 in T51N, R71W; Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 24 in T51N, R72W; Sections 31, 32, 33 and 34 in T52N, R72W; Sections 1 and 12 in T51N, R73W; and in Section 36 in T52N, R73W; 6th Principal Meridian located in Campbell County, Wyoming. A conference shall be held if the Director determines that the nature of the complaint or the position of the complainants indicates that an attempt to informally resolve the disputes is preferable to a contested case proceeding. An informal conference or a public hearing shall be held within twenty (20) days after the final date for filing objections unless a different period is stipulated to by the parties. The Council or Director shall publish notice of the time, date and location of the hearing or conference in a newspaper of general circulation in the locality of the proposed operation once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks immediately prior to the hearing or conference. The hearing would be conducted as a contested case in accordance with the Wyoming Administrative Procedure Act (W.S. §16-3-101 through §16-3-115), and the right of judicial review would be afforded as provided in that act. The Wyoming Oil and Gas Conservation Commission will be mailed a copy of the application mine plan map as given in W.S. §35-11-406(j).
