Impacts Due to Delaying the Effective Date

During the April 14, 2020 special meeting, the City Council amended the 2020 utility rate ordinance on second reading to delay the Effective Date from May 1, 2020 to July 1, 2020. The City Council also requested City Staff review and determine potential adverse implications if the Effective Date of the ordinance was further delayed to October 1, 2020, or later.

City Staff has identified the following impacts associated with delaying the Effective Date of the utility rate increase ordinance from **July 1, 2020 to October 1, 2020**.

Water Distribution Rates- proposed \$1.10 per month increase per typical residential customer

The proposed water distribution rate increase was expected to generate an additional \$187,000 for the FY 20/21 water fund budget, if the rates went into effect on, or prior to, July 1, 2020. By delaying the Effective date from July 1, 2020 to October 1, 2020, the proposed revenue projections associated with this increase for the FY 20/21 water fund budget will be reduced by \$46,750, from \$187,000 to \$140,250.

The application of additional reserves will be necessary to make-up the short-fall, and balance the FY 20/21 water fund budget if the Effective Date is delayed until October 1, 2020.

Delaying the effective date by 3 months will also have an effect on future water fund revenue requirements in FY 21/22 and FY 22/23. Rather than 10% increase(s) each year, for the next several years; we will need a 12% increase in FY 21/22 and an 11.5% increase in FY 22/23 to generate enough revenue to meet the same targeted unobligated fund balance in FY 24/25.

Sewer Rates - proposed \$4.04 per month increase per typical residential customer

If the Effective Date is delayed until October 1, 2020, staff does not foresee any immediate, adverse impacts associated with our current application to the State of Wyoming for the \$20 million Capital Construction Loan for improvements at the City's wastewater treatment plant. However, delaying the Effective Date will require additional rate increases, above what was expected, in future years.

In addition to generating the needed revenue to cover future principal and interest payments for the \$20 million state loan, revenue from the proposed sewer rate increase is also necessary to cover rising operation and maintenance costs within the sewer fund. Based on the results from the sewer fund pro-forma presented to the City Council during the January 28, 2020 work session, City Staff identified the need to increase revenue by the following amounts over the next several years.

By delaying the Effective Date from July 1, 2020 to October 1, 2020, sewer rates will need to increase from 15.0% to 17.0% in FY 21/22 and from 10% to 12.25% in FY 22/23 to generate the same, total revenue required over the six year period. Likewise, this assumes all future rate increases will go into effect on July 1 for each year starting in 2021. Delaying the Effective Date in future years will also increase future rates.

The proposed sewer rate increase was expected to generate an additional \$800,000 for the FY 20/21 sewer fund budget. By delaying the Effective Date of the proposed ordinance to October 1, 2020, the revised revenue projections for the FY 20/21 sewer fund budget from this rate increase will be reduced by \$200,000, from \$800,000 to \$600,000. The application of additional reserves will be necessary to make-up the short-fall, and balance the FY 20/21 sewer fund budget if the Effective Date is delayed until October 1, 2020.

ITC Testing Hits Pause Amidst Pandemic

Like every other organization, business or individual, the global COVID-19 pandemic is impacting operations at the Wyoming ITC. Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon has taken actions to limit the transmission of COVID-19, issuing statewide public health orders that temporarily closed many public facilities and limited physical presence within State buildings and facilities.

Based upon these actions, as a State of Wyoming operated facility, all testing and construction activities at the ITC have been suspended and shall remain in effect until a date still be to determined. We are continuing to review the situation and follow Governor Gordon's guidance on the resumption of operations. The most recent information on Wyoming's COVID-19 response can be found by [here](#).

Recognizing many ITC tenants are temporary visitors, necessitating the use of hotels and restaurants, and would be traveling from outside of Wyoming, we feel like this is the most prudent move to ensure the health of both our tenants and the citizens of

northeastern Wyoming. We are mindful of the current strains on healthcare providers here in Wyoming and across the country. We do not want to place any additional burdens on local resources.

We are well aware of the fact tenants are in various stages of mobilizing and some have equipment on site, so we are working closely with all of our stakeholders to minimize impacts. We ask everyone with access to the site to follow the most recent CDC guidance regarding hygiene practices and limit interaction with others.

Specific guidance includes, but is not limited to:

- The site remains secure and accessible for non-testing and construction activities to those appropriately credentialed.
- Non-critical business guests and visitors will not be allowed on site.
- ITC staff will continue routine site walk-throughs, monitor in-place equipment and communicate any issues should they arise.
- ITC and WIA staff will continue to work and will be available to support projects, permitting, grant applications, leases, etc.
- The Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) remains available to answer questions and process permits, although certain personnel may be telecommuting and certain practices may be temporarily altered.

We are all working to navigate this unprecedented situation to be best of our abilities. In a rapidly changing environment, clear and regular communication will ensure our actions cause the least amount of disruption. The 2020 Census is underway and more households across America are responding every day. Over 70 million households have responded to date, representing over 48% of all households in America. In light of the COVID-19 outbreak, the U.S. Census Bureau is adjusting 2020 Census operations in order to:

- Protect the health and safety of the American public and Census Bureau employees;
- Implement guidance from Federal, State, and local authorities; and
- Ensure a complete and accurate count of all communities.

The Census Bureau temporarily suspended 2020 Census field data collection activities in March. Steps are already being taken to reactivate field offices beginning June 1, 2020, in preparation for the resumption of field data collection operations as quickly as possible following June 1.

In-person activities, including all interaction with the public, enumeration, office work, and processing activities, will incorporate the most current guidance to promote the health and safety of staff and the public. This will include recommended personal protective equipment (PPE) and social distancing practices.

Once 2020 Census data collection is complete, the Census Bureau begins a lengthy, thorough, and scientifically rigorous process to produce the apportionment counts, redistricting information, and other statistical data products which help guide hundreds of billions of dollars in public and private sector spending per year.

In order to ensure the completeness and accuracy of the 2020 Census, the Census Bureau is seeking statutory relief from Congress of 120 additional calendar days to deliver final apportionment counts.

Under this plan, the Census Bureau would extend the window for field data collection and self-response to October 31, 2020, which will allow for apportionment counts to be delivered to the President by April 30, 2021, and redistricting data to be delivered to the states no later than July 31, 2021.

Wyoming Cost of Living Index for the Fourth Quarter of 2019

CHEYENNE - The State of Wyoming, Economic Analysis Division has released the fourth quarter of 2019 Wyoming Cost of Living Index (WCLI). Inflation is reported for the State, by consumer category, and for five regions in the State. Inflation measures year-over-year price changes in six consumer categories. The inflation figures for the fourth quarter of 2019 represent the percent change in the price level of a standard basket of selected consumer items priced in the fourth quarter of 2019, compared with the price level of the same goods recorded one year ago (fourth quarter of 2018).

- All Items Statewide inflation 2.2%
- Statewide inflation by consumer category:
 - Apparel 7.1%
 - Medical 4.0%
 - Housing 2.7%
 - Transportation 1.4%
 - Food 0.9%
 - Recreation & Personal Care. -0.4%
- Regional inflation rates:
 - Northwest 2.5%
 - Southeast 2.5%
 - Central 2.3%
 - Northeast 1.9%
 - Southwest 1.6%

Nationally, the inflation rate from December 2018 to December 2019 was 2.3% (CPI-U), as reported by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) in the Consumer Price Index.

The Wyoming Cost of Living Index (WCLI) consists of two parts, **Inflation**, which measures year-over-year change (annual) and the **Comparative Cost of Living Index** which compares each county's cost of living in one period (not over time) to the statewide average. The Comparative Cost of Living Index represents each county's price level compared to the statewide average (100)

during a single time period, in this case, the fourth quarter of 2019. For the fourth quarter of 2019, the Comparative Cost of Living Index ranked Teton (161) as the county with the highest **All Items** value, which indicates that the cost of living in Teton County was estimated 61 percent higher than the statewide average in the quarter.

Comparative Cost of Living Index values for all counties in Wyoming are listed in Table 1 on page 3. Movement in ranking from a previous survey does not indicate that the price level has increased or decreased in a particular county. Instead, these values reflect relative price levels in each county, *at the time of data collection*, compared with the statewide average of 100. Comparative Cost of Living Index data were also produced by consumer category for every county.

Survey Methodology

The WCLI is produced biannually, the second quarter and fourth quarter. Price data are collected in twenty-eight cities and towns in Wyoming and the data are used to build a Comparative Cost of Living Index by county and to estimate overall inflation rates for Wyoming and the five designated regions of the State. A map of the twenty-eight cities where price data were collected is on page 4.

Communities across the State are included in the WCLI based on the following criteria: First, the largest city or town in each county is priced; additionally, prices are collected in any city or town with populations greater than 5,000 or in cases of a city or town having at least 80 percent of a county's largest community's population. In counties where only one community was priced, those prices were used to represent the entire county. In counties where two communities were surveyed, a population-weighted average of the prices for the two communities was used for the entire county. In addition, starting with the second quarter of 2003 WCLI report, Afton, in Lincoln County, was added as a sampling point through legislative action in 2003. Kemmerer is still priced. Afton and Kemmerer report separate Comparative Cost of Living Index numbers. Beginning with the second quarter of 2004, Afton, has been included in the inflation calculations.

The 140 consumer items surveyed were aggregated into six categories, which were then weighted using item weights from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), reflective of their overall importance in the average consumer's budget. These categories, and their respective weight components, include Housing (48.4%), Transportation (16.3%), Food (13.3%), Recreation & Personal Care (9.5%), Medical (8.7%), and Apparel (3.8%).

The data are weighted by population to more accurately represent the price changes experienced by the majority of consumers in Wyoming.



CARES Act Update

Dear Wyoming elected officials,

The Department of Workforce Services (DWS) is currently putting processes in place to distribute important funding under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES) Act. We are making progress and fully intend to begin accepting UI applications from those individuals who qualify for the CARES Act benefits by the end of the week of April 27, if not sooner.

The CARES Act includes:

Increased Unemployment Insurance compensation benefits: This emergency benefit provides most individuals an emergency increase in traditional unemployment insurance benefits of \$600 per week through July 26, 2020. This increase will be added automatically to claims that qualify. There is no need to apply for this benefit. These payments, and the back-pay for those who qualified between March 29 and the date the benefits are paid, will be processed beginning the end of the week of April 27, if not sooner.

Protecting grocery & other essential workers from COVID-19

Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA): This emergency benefit provides up to 39 weeks of unemployment insurance benefits to people not otherwise eligible for regular unemployment, including the self-employed and those who have exhausted their regular and extended benefits. DWS fully intends to begin processing applications for PUA claims by the end of the week of April 27.

Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC): This benefit provides an additional 13 weeks of emergency unemployment insurance for people who remain unemployed after they have exhausted their traditional unemployment benefits. DWS is diligently working to create the system necessary to implement the PEUC, and a notification will be posted on wyomingworkforce.org when this system is open and ready for applications. Payments will be retroactive to March 29 for those who qualified before the system becomes open.

I will notify you directly through this email once the funding becomes available. Additionally, DWS will reach out to claimants directly through email when possible, and the department will post an update on its website at wyomingworkforce.org when the system is opened for claimants who qualify for CARES benefits. Notices also will be sent to the media as well as posted on the department's Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn profiles.

CARES claimants will be able to file UI claims online at wyui.wyo.gov as soon as the system is in place.

Finally, UI phone lines are still experiencing heavy volume. DWS is in the process of hiring a call center with federal funds to assist with alleviating the lines and getting people served as quickly as possible.

Filing online at wyui.wyo.gov is the best way for individuals to file for unemployment benefits. If that option is not available to someone, at this time, DWS is still encouraging individuals use the alphabetical system recently put in place should they need to use a phone line to file benefits:

- Claimant's last name begins with A-M: file claims on Monday, Wednesday or before noon on Friday.
- Claimant's last name begins with N-Z: file claims on Tuesday, Thursday or after noon on Friday.

DWS issues CARES payments; additional \$600/week will be applied to UI claims next week

CHEYENNE – The Department of Workforce Services (DWS) has begun issuing Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation to those individuals who are receiving unemployment benefits. This additional \$600 per week is being added to unemployment benefits automatically, and qualifying claimants will receive these payments by the middle of next week.

Congress passed the CARES Act at the end of March, and DWS has been working diligently to create a system to administer the funds to Wyoming workers who have lost their jobs due to COVID-19.

"The Wyoming Department of Workforce Services is working tirelessly around the clock to provide these additional financial resources to our Wyoming neighbors," said DWS Workforce Programs Administrator Holly McKamey Simoni. "The \$600 per week addition will be applied to unemployment benefits automatically. Those who are receiving unemployment benefits already do not have to do anything to get these funds."

Additional \$600 per week

As part of the CARES Act, unemployment benefits are being expanded to provide an additional \$600 per week. These benefits are retroactive to the week of March 29 through April 4, 2020, and extend through July 25, 2020. This temporary emergency increase in benefits is referred to as the Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) program.

Those who were receiving UI benefits before these payments began will receive the previous weeks' benefits in their first payment. These payments will appear in bank accounts or on US Bank-issued debit cards by the middle of next week.

Claimants are advised not to call about these funds, as they are being automatically applied. The amount being deposited will be reflected in claimants' WYUI accounts at wyui.wyo.gov.

Claimants who currently have federal withholding tax taken out of their benefits will see the same 10% reduction in the FPUC payment, resulting in a \$540 payment. Child support also will be deducted from the FPUC payment, when applicable.

The \$600 is paid automatically. Claimants do not need to apply for it.

Other CARES Act benefits coming soon include:

Self-employed, contractors or gig economy workers

The CARES Act also temporarily makes unemployment compensation available to self-employed, independent contractors, gig economy workers, and others not normally eligible for the benefit. The program is referred to as Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA). These workers cannot apply through the department's UC online system at this time. The U.S. Department of Labor requires that PUA be tracked separately from regular UC. For this reason, Wyoming is building a new online platform to process PUA benefits.

DWS fully expects that eligible individuals should be able to start applying for PUA benefits by the end of the week of April 27. Eligible claimants will receive backdated payments to January 27, 2020, or the first week they were unable to work due to COVID-19, whichever of the two dates is later. The PUA benefit will end December 31, 2020. DWS will announce when the PUA benefit application is available, and applicants will be able to apply for those benefits at that time online at wyui.wyo.gov.

13-Week Benefit Extension

The CARES Act provides an additional 13 weeks of unemployment compensation, including for workers who exhaust their regular unemployment benefits. Claimants will be eligible for Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC) from the week beginning March 29, 2020, through the end of the year. DWS is awaiting additional federal guidance about the program and will provide an update when information is available.
